At Beechwood Primary School, we aim to provide learning opportunities in history which encourage children to:

- *Inspire our pupils' curiosity to know more about the past.*
- *Understand the process of change, the diversity of societies as well as their own identity and the challenges of their time.*
- *Ask perceptive questions, think critically, weigh evidence, sift arguments and develop perspective and judgment.*

Our history curriculum is driven by three golden threads that provide a framework for learning and help to deepen children's understanding of what is being taught from Early Years to Year 6. These threads are **community and culture, achievements and legacy** and **migration**. Alongside our explicit history units in Years 1-6, we also have *Spotlight on Crewe* units where children study the local geography and history of Crewe in both autumn and summer terms.
